MAPLETON'S VERGE GARDENS ARE FLOURISHING!

Back in November 2024, three Mapleton properties set out to transform their grass street verges into native gardens with the support of Backyards for Biodiversity SEQ and funds from the Sunshine Coast Council, via Councillor David Law.

Well, their efforts have been rewarded. The weather since has been more than kind to the new plants and the nature strips are bursting with life, encouraging pollinators such as birds, bees and other insects.

Just look at these before and after photos of one of them! The plants for this initiative were sourced from the Florabunda Landcare group in Woombye, with the owner making additional plantings with stock from Barung Landcare and Forest Heart ecoNursery in Maleny.





The initiative has demonstrated how small individual efforts such as this collectively contribute to the ecological health of our unique region, creating a more sustainable and vibrant urban environment.

If you're inspired by the Mapleton verge gardens and want to créate your own native space, here are some tips to get you started:

Plan your space

Observe the area to be planted throughout the day to see how much sunlight it gets.

Check the soil type.

Consider how much space you have and plan for a mix of groundcovers, shrubs, and small trees to create layers of habitat. Check for any infrastructure cabling to be avoided.

2. **Choose the right native plants**Visit local native nurseries like Florabunda Landcare in Woombye, or Forest Heart ecoNursery and Barung Landcare in Maleny for plants suited to your soil, aspect and climate. Use a mix of flowering and foliage plants to create seasonal interest and attract vital pollinators.

Use mulch to retain moisture and suppress weeds (but keep it away from the base of plants to prevent rot).

3. **Refer to the Council Guidelines for verge gardens**If you're planning a verge garden, check out the Sunshine Coast Council's verge garden guidelines.

4. Encourage local wildlife

Add a shallow water dish or birdbath to attract native birds and insects.

Leave some leaf litter, logs or large stones to provide habitat for small creatures like lizards.

5. Maintain your garden

Water your new plants regularly until they establish. If you're lucky, mother nature will do this for you!

Prune plants occasionally to encourage bushy growth and remove dead material.

Share cuttings or seeds with neighbours to help expand the biodiversity movement in your area.

By creating a native garden — whether on your verge, backyard, or in a shared community space — you're contributing to the health and sustainability of our precious environment, now and into the future.







Before he turned to fiction Chris Hammer was a journalist for more than thirty years. He was chief political correspondent for The Bulletin, senior writer for The Age and Online Political Editor for The Age and The Sydney Morning Herald. As a foreign affairs correspondent for SBS Dateline he reported from six continents.

These days he is, of course, best known for his 'bush noir' novels - a category which might have been created just for his books. They unravel in far-flung parts of Australia: in the opal fields of Lightning Ridge, out in north-western Victoria, in marginal country. They are Crime, but more than crime, they avoid

stereotypes and are rooted within the landscape. They also happen to be incredibly popular, selling all over the world, millions to date, with two of them adapted for television under the title of Scrublands.

One part of the explanation for his success could be that he knows the country. In 2010 he decided he'd had enough of Canberra's machinations and set off to travel the length of the Murray/Darling, from the Channel Country right down to Adelaide. This was during the millennium drought and his journey, and the people he met along the way, became the subject of his award winning non-fiction book, The River, a remarkable analysis of the complexities of



our longest and most important waterway. His novels mine this knowledge. They are populated by individuals whose lives we recognise. Yes, there's been a crime committed, and his protagonists, Nell Buchanan or Martin Scarsden, will have to figure out who did it, but there's always more to it than that.

In his new novel, Legacy, the investigative reporter Martin Scarsden is the centre of the action, not because he's caught the scent of wrong-doing, but because someone is out to kill him. He's on the run, heading out into the desert, although it seems even there he isn't safe. He has to simultaneously protect himself, and try to find out who it is that wants him dead.

Chris Hammer will be in conversation with Steven Lang. They'll be discussing Legacy, but also The River, which has been re-issued this year. It's an event you won't want to miss.

Outspoken has a busy couple of months ahead. There are also events with Heather Rose, Bob Brown and Hugh Mackay. Head to their website to find out more.



Existing categories: Changes have been made to current blue card categories.

STORM RECOVERY AT QCCC MAPLETON

The long recovery from last October's destructive hailstorm continues to be felt across our village. It's hard to miss how many local homes have required full roof replacements. Like the rest of Mapleton, QCCC wasn't spared—and with our large site and extensive infrastructure, the impact has been particularly significant.

This summer, we'll begin major re-roofing works on several of our accommodation buildings and staff houses. It's a logistical challenge, juggling repairs while staying operational for the many groups we host, but an essential step in maintaining our facilities and serving our guests well. With dozens of roof sections and a complex insurance process, it's a substantial task.

The storm didn't just damage buildings—it also wiped out our entire avocado crop. Our on-site orchard of 200 trees usually produces a seasonal abundance, enjoyed by our kitchen team and often gifted to teachers heading home from camp. We know our experience reflects that of many in the local community. As Mapleton continues to rebuild, we're deeply grateful for the patience and understanding of our neighbours, guests, and partner schools. We remain committed to supporting and serving the community we're proud to call home.

Grow Australian Plants LOCAL

Callicoma serratifolia

A large shrub to small tree for temperate to subtropical areas, fast growing to around 18 metres in cultivation.

It has attractive serrated shiny leaves with contrasting pale fuzzy undersides and the new growth is bronze coloured with rusty hairs.

It flowers in late spring to early summer with lemon coloured fluffy flowers which resemble Acacia flowers, hence the common name.

Australia's early settlers used this plant to make buildings of wattle and daub too.

It naturally grows in moist sheltered areas, but is reasonably adaptable. Good in sun or light shade. Frost tender when young, but frost tolerant once established.

Currently flowering across the region. One of the best flowering for many years.





COMMON CICADABIRD





Other names for the Common Cicadabird include Sahul Cicadabird and Slender-billed Cicadabird. It is named after its cicada-like call. They are a medium-small Cuckoo-shrike, length 24-26 cm, but unlike other Cuckoo-shrikes they do not shuffle their wings on landing. Because of their shyness and their habit of keeping to the upper foliage they are generally thought to be less common than they probably are.

The adult male and female Cicada birds differ in colouring. The male, a little larger than the female, is overall deep blue-grey with an indistinct black streak through its dark brown eye. Its bill and legs are black.

The female's upperparts are grey-brown while the underparts are creamy buff, with dark brown barring, similar to a female Varied Triller. Its brown eyes have a dark brown stripe through them. Its bill is brown with a pale base.

Immatures are similar to females but with heavier barring.

They have a wide distribution through the south-western Pacific, New Guinea and adjacent islands and northern and eastern Australia. In the Sunshine Coast area, they occur mainly in tall wet sclerophyll forest and sometimes in dryer sclerophyll forest and woodlands. They are present for most of the year but are hard to find in winter months when most migrate to northern Australia.

Their food includes insects such as beetles, wood crickets, stick insects and fruit and seeds taken in the tall canopy of trees.

They are usually silent but in the breeding season (generally from October through to January) they make a high-pitched cicada-like buzzing descending call which may be repeated 8-20 times. They lay one largish blotched pale green egg in a small cup-shaped nest built by the male.

WEED

African tulip tree

Spathodea campanulata

Category 3 Restricted Matter (Biosecurity Act 2014)

A large tree with large compound leaves arranged in pairs along the branches. Its large and very showy flowers (10-12cm long) are borne in clusters at the tips of the branches. These flowers are orange red, somewhat tulip shaped, and have yellow crinkled margins. Its large elongated capsules (up to 30cm long) resemble pods and split open to release numerous papery seeds.

African tulip tree is regarded as a significant environmental weed in Queensland, the Northern Territory, and on Christmas Island. It is also regarded as a potential environmental weed or "sleeper weed" in northern New South Wales and other parts of northern Australia. This species is also listed in the Global Invasive Species Database (GISD), and is regarded to be among the top 100 of the world worst invasive alien species.

The African Tulip is toxic to native stingless bees and a range of other insects.

GREEN LIGHT FOR GRASSROOTS ENVIRONMENTAL GRANTS

Community groups across Mapleton and the hinterland are being encouraged to apply for the State Government's Grassroots Environmental Grants, with funding now available to support local projects aimed at protecting and preserving our environment.

The program provides annual funding rounds to back small but impactful initiatives in towns, rural centres, and cities right across the state.

Member for Nicklin Marty Hunt said the grants deliver \$800,000 to support local, community-led conservation efforts.

"We've got many community groups who are already rolling up their sleeves to protect our incredible natural environment," Mr Hunt said.

"Groups can apply for up to \$15,000 for equipment purchases or facility upgrades to boost their capability and reach, and up to \$30,000 for on-ground conservation projects such as revegetation, habitat restoration, and native species protection."

Applications for Round 1: Environmental Conservation close at 4pm, Wednesday 8 October 2025.

"The strength of this program is that it's designed for grassroots groups - it's about locals making a difference right here in our own backyard," he said.

"If you've been thinking about a project to restore habitat, protect native species, or improve sustainability, now is the time to get your application in."






