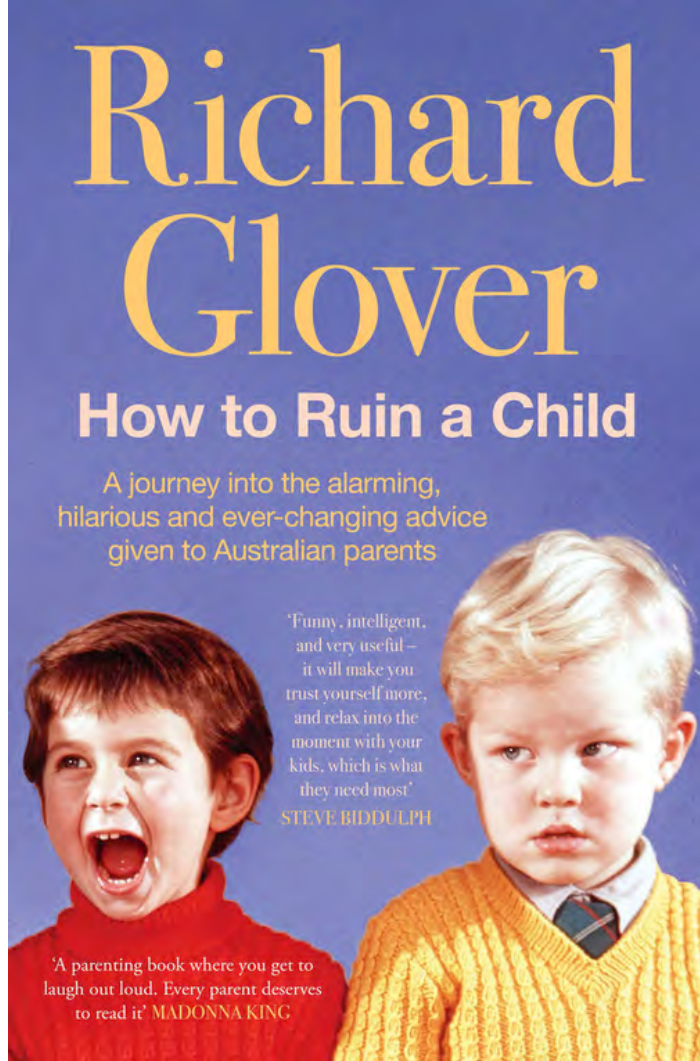

What to look for in wild birds



Look for birds with unusual signs of disease such as:

- Groups of dead birds at lakes or beaches
- lack of coordination, tremors, swimming in circles
- twisted neck or other abnormal posture
- inability to stand or fly



Birds associated with water are especially at risk of H5 bird flu.



H5 Bird Flu: Five Things You Can Do

from 'Birdlife Australia'

H5 bird flu poses a serious threat to Australia's native birds and wildlife. While the risk to human health remains low, the virus can spread rapidly among birds, particularly in areas where they gather. There are several practical steps people can take to help reduce the spread and protect vulnerable wildlife.

1. Learn the signs and report suspected cases.

People can help by recognising symptoms such as difficulty breathing, standing, walking or flying, weakness, lethargy, poor coordination, tremors, unusual posture and twisted necks. Groups of dead or dying birds, especially seabirds, waterbirds, shorebirds and birds of prey, should also raise concern.

Suspected cases should be reported immediately to the 24/7 Emergency Animal Disease Hotline on 1800 675 888. People should keep their distance, avoid touching sick or dead birds, keep dogs away from carcasses, and record sightings safely with photos, location, date and details of symptoms.

2. Avoid disturbing birds.

Healthy birds are better able to cope with disease. Keeping cats indoors can protect native wildlife and reduce the risk of cats becoming infected through eating affected birds. Dogs should be kept on a leash around beaches, wetlands, lakes and other areas where birds gather. People should also follow site closures, practise responsible birdwatching and avoid getting too close to nesting birds.

3. Do not feed wild birds.

Bird feeders can encourage birds to gather closely together, increasing the chance of disease spreading. Instead, people can support birds by creating bird-friendly gardens that provide natural food, shelter and nesting opportunities. This encourages birds to find food naturally and reduces overcrowding around feeding stations.

4. Provide clean water.

Bird baths can remain an important resource, particularly as warmer weather approaches. Providing several shallow water sources can benefit different bird species. However, water should be replaced and cleaned daily to prevent contamination. Bird baths can be scrubbed with hot water and an appropriate vinegar or diluted bleach solution, then thoroughly rinsed and dried. Hands should always be washed after cleaning or handling bird-water sources.

5. Add your voice.

Although H5 bird flu currently presents a low risk to people, it could have devastating effects on Australian wildlife. Individuals can support conservation by advocating for stronger protection of birds and their habitats. BirdLife Australia is also calling for increased government funding to improve wildlife monitoring, habitat restoration, invasive species control and other conservation efforts.

Small actions such as reporting sick birds, reducing disturbance, avoiding bird feeding and maintaining clean water can collectively make a significant difference in protecting Australia's wildlife from H5 bird flu.

Grow Australian Plants

Leptospermum flavescens **‘Cardwell’ – Tea tree**

Fast-growing, versatile large shrub to 2m high and wide with a weeping habit.

Leaves are aromatic when crushed.

Numerous small white flowers; looking like they are snow-covered late winter to late spring. Buds are pale pink.

Sunny to partly shaded spots, but best flowering is with more sun. Prefers well-drained soil.

Screening, informal hedging or shaped into a small weeping feature shrub; moderately frost tolerant once established and low maintenance.

Attracts bees, butterflies and other insects.

Currently flowering in gardens across the region.



BLACK-FACED CUCKOO-SHRIKE

Coracina novaehollandiae

Black-faced Cuckoo-shrikes are neither cuckoos nor shrikes but are called so because their feathers have similar patterns to those of cuckoos and their beak shape resembles that of shrikes. Among many birdwatchers they are known simply as BFCS or 'bifcus'.

They are a fairly common bird widely distributed throughout Australia and can be found in almost all habitats except dense forests and treeless deserts. Sightings on the Range include Mapleton, Flaxton and Montville and they are often seen perched on exposed branches or on overhead power lines.

They are a slender attractive bird 33 cm long with a black face and throat, black bill and dark brown eyes. Their back, wings and tail are blue grey and underparts are white. The sexes are alike. Immatures are similar but with a grey face, broad black eye stripe and faintly barred breast.

They have a strong undulating flight and a curious habit of shuffling their wings upon landing, a practice that gave rise to the name "Shufflewing" which is often used for this species.

Food includes a variety of large insects such as cicadas, grasshoppers and stick insects caught mid-air or taken from foliage, or less frequently from the ground.

Breeding occurs Aug-Feb in a small saucer-shaped nest 8-20m high made of grass and twigs placed on a horizontal branch. The nest is so small that when the nestlings are feathered, they sit on it rather than in it.

\$24,768 GRANT A HUGE WIN FOR MAPLETON STATE SCHOOL

"The Gambling Community Benefit Fund provides a great opportunity for community organisations to secure funding for projects that make a real difference on the ground.

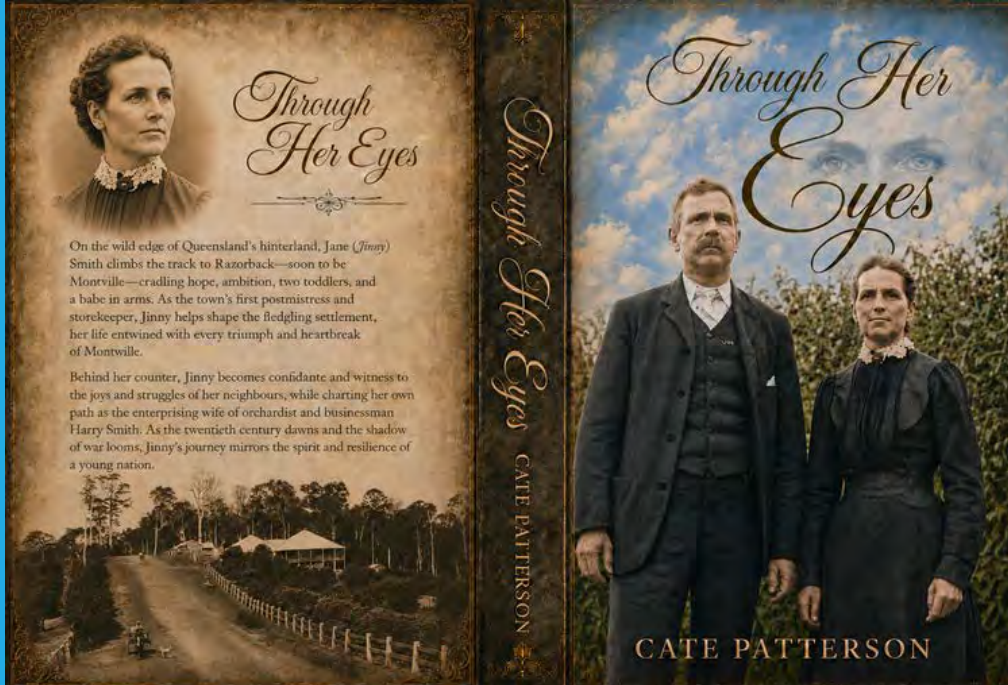
"I'm pleased to see another \$24,768 coming into the Nicklin electorate and look forward to seeing the students at Mapleton State School enjoying the new equipment."

In the same round, the Australasian Country Music Association in Yandina received \$35,000 to install air conditioning, Cooroy Community Bowls Club received \$35,000 for facility upgrades, and Nambour Heights Bowls Club received \$7,920 for upgrades to their clubhouse.

The Gambling Community Benefit Fund is Queensland's largest one-off community grants program and distributes approximately \$60 million each year to not-for-profit community groups. A new online grants system is due to be rolled out before the next round opens.

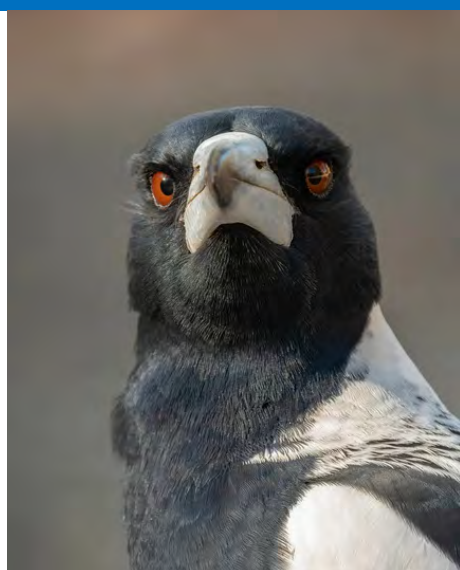

IT'S MAGPIE SWOOPING SEASON

Spring has sprung, and magpie swooping season has begun! Australian Magpies are infamous for their swooping behaviour. Magpies are starting to nest around Australia – which means swooping season is upon us. Here's how you can help keep yourself (and your neighbourhood magpies!) safe this swooping season!

Why do magpies swoop?

When magpie breeding season begins, so too does the swooping. Swooping usually occurs when the magpies have young in the nest, or just after the young have fledged, when they are at their most vulnerable to predators. Magpies swoop to protect their chicks from whatever they perceive as nearby threats. To a magpie, the faster you're moving, the greater the threat – which is why cyclists, joggers and dog-walkers are common targets.

People often assume that swooping by magpies is aggressive behaviour, but experts agree that it is generally a defence strategy aimed at deterring potential predators which may harm the young birds. Unfortunately, people fit into this category. But despite their reputation, magpie attacks are relatively rare – less than 10% of males swoop people, and research suggests it's a learned behaviour.

Most magpies don't swoop, and of those that do, only a tiny minority actually make contact. Most of the time, birds will make a harmless (though often terrifying) near miss, accompanied by beak clicking.

Where (and when) swooping season occurs

Typically, the breeding season for Australian Magpies is from August to November – with swooping regularly recorded each spring across the mainland and virtually everywhere magpies occur. Swooping season usually commences first in the northern parts of the magpies’ range, and then progressively moves southwards, with records in south-eastern Queensland and northern New South Wales usually starting in July and August. This contrasts with southern Victoria, where swooping season peaks in September. However, earlier reports are not unknown throughout their range.

Did you know: magpies rarely swoop people in Tasmania – but the reason for their relaxed attitude to people is unknown.

How to avoid being swooped

- To reduce the risk of being swooped by a magpie, try these steps:
- Keep your distance: If you can, it’s best to avoid the area during swooping season – usually for a month or so while chicks are still in the nest. Otherwise, it’s best to keep a safe distance from their nest and move quickly through the area: magpies typically swoop pedestrians within 50 metres of their nest, or 100 metres for cyclists.
- Get off your bike: if you’re on a bike, it’s safest to get off and walk away. Attaching cable ties to your helmet or a flag to your bike will also help direct swooping birds away from your face.
- Wear sunglasses and a hat or helmet to help protect your face while walking or riding near swooping magpies. You can even try drawing a pair of eyes and wearing them at the back of your head, as birds are less likely to attack if they think you’re watching them.

What to do if you get swooped by a magpie

If you do get swooped, try to stay calm. Move quickly and safely out of the area and don’t try to scare away or fight the bird. Magpies are very intelligent and can recognise faces, you don’t want to be remembered for the wrong reasons! To a magpie, if you run away screaming with arms flailing, this confirms you’re a threat that needs swooping.
